Meanwhile, I have kept myself busy turning candlestick holders, a honey dipper. and finished off a fruit bowl.

Macrocarpa.....or is it?

The Monterey Peninsula in California, 130km south of San Francisco, is noteworthy for a number of reasons. In an 1846 battle Mexico was defeated there and California became part of the United States. Fishing was the major industry in the early decades of the 20th Century and the canneries werethe setting for John Steinbeck's famous novel Cannery Row. Nowadays golfers dream about playing the Pebble Beach course but at \$US675 a round it remains a dream for most. Tiger Woods hit an astounding shot there at the 2010 US Open: on the par 5 18th his second shot was stymied by a tree and so he hit a 273 yard slice over the ocean and birdied the hole. And that tree was a **Monterey cypress**.

The Monterey cypress is a **glacial relic**. During the last ice age when the climate was much colder and wetter its distribution was more widespread but as the world warmed the population retreated and its last refuge was on the Monterey Peninsula, a cool and moist outcrop jutting into the Pacific Ocean.There it is found naturally in just two small nature reserves. Most of us know it as Cupressus macrocarpa, macrocarpa for short and it is also





called golden cypress. Botanists have recently discovered that the New World cypresses are different to the Old World ones and so it has a new name, **Hesperocyparis macrocarpa**. Seeds of the tree were sent to England and Ireland in the 1800s and there it grew much better than at home, thriving in the wetter conditions and reaching heights of up to 40 metres and a trunk diameter of 2.5m. Eventually it spread to the colonies, thriving in New Zealand and southern Australia. Not so much in South Africa where the Cape trees are gnarled and wind-sculpted, much as they on the Monterey Peninsula. It is also grown in

In southern Victoria, Monterey cypress was and is frequently grown as windbreaks on farms.



many are now being felled and so the timber is becoming increasingly available commercially.

It was also commonly planted in parks, camping grounds and Avenues of Honour, Queenscliff being a notable example. Since the trees aren't long-lived, 100 years or so,

The heartwood colour is yellowbrown, darker in old trees. The grain

is usually straight but can deviate considerably around knots from large branches. It has a fine, uniform texture with visible growth rings and a distinct, fragrant scent. Ray tissue gives the wood a lustrous appearance similar to that of hoop pine or kauri. It is a lightweight but strong softwood that is resistant to insect and borer attacks.

Monterey cypress is easy to work with hand and machine tools. It glues, stains and finishes well. Bending properties are reportedly very poor. These qualities result in a wide array of uses including: fence posts, weatherboards, exposed rafters and beams (internal), tongue and groove panelling, slabs for kitchen and bar tops, furniture and cabinet making, flamenco guitars, boatbuilding, picture frames, wood turning and carving.

As you will be well aware, Monterey pine or pinus radiata is also a common tree in these parts. It too is only found naturally on the Monterey Peninsula and also in two other very small areas on the Californian coast and two islands off Mexico. Peter Goddard
