Wandering wood



Some months ago the club was alerted to a planned tree clearing at the site of the Eltham Gateway Project. A number of pine trees and Monterey Cypruss (Macrocarpa)were removed as they were considered "weed trees" or were "nearing the end of their

life". https://www.nillumbik.vic.gov.au/Develop/Council-projects-and-works/Eltham-Gateway-Project. The council showing considerable wisdom decided to have the Macrocarpa trees milled for use in the project and excess lumber was to be offered to community groups free of charge. In the course of the operation, a considerable quantity of milled timber was stolen and as a result, the amount the club received was greatly reduced. What was available has been stored in Lorraine Kruger's shed for drying.

In a surprise development, a quantity of the timber originally set aside has not been claimed and it is now offered to the club for the taking. The picture above is of one stack (there are two) and is available for the taking. the timber is very fast drying, very stable and can be made into a large variety of both indoor and outdoor furniture. Is anyone interested in this project for which the timber is ideal.

On Friday 7th July Nillumbik Council are going to deliver this load of timber at 11am and it will be a mixture of macrocarpa and radiata pine. It will come in lengths of about 4m., so it will need to be cut in half for transporting. If you want some you will have to bring a chain saw, or secondly a circular saw, or thirdly a hand saw. We will have the wood available on Friday from 11am and all weekend, then on Monday what is left will go to St. Andrews Men's Shed.
