Around the Workshop July 2022 – Charles Camera

This month the workshop's new router lift was in operation. The old Triton unit was very capable but presented huge problems with infrequent users unable to navigate some of the tricky steps in setting up router bit changes and height adjustment. The new router lift mechanism is extremely simple to use as per Peter Davey's instructions which were emailed out to all members. It is expected that there will be no more problems and the investment well worth the cost. Elsewhere the drum sander has also "settled down" and the main reason for damage to the sanding medium having occurred was a "misbehaving" retaining clip on the front drum which is now fixed. Please however continue to use caution when using it as it is a delicate machine, easy to damage with improper use. If the sanding paper is damaged or becomes worn please advise a member of the committee –changing it is not a job for anyone to do as it requires specialist knowledge.

As reported last month we have a 10 mm domino cutter for the Festool machine and now we also have a stock of 10 mm dominos to use with it. Using the 1/3, 1/3, 1/3 rule for mortises, these will enable 30 to 40 mm stock to be jointed with a single floating tenon or two aligned in tandem thus allowing easy jointing of, for example, table legs. Please note the dominos are not free – the cost is marked on the respective containers for each size.

It has been noted that many blast gates are often closed and sometimes machines are being run without them being opened. Please check when setting up especially if you are the first to start to use the machine for the session. AND please remember to press the shaker button every time you start up or shut down the extractor system.

Collin Groves – our tireless key holder and volunteer to do everything has organised a cleanup for Saturday July 23rd. Starting at 9.00am with a sausage sizzle at 12.00pm. The main aim of the working bee will be to clean and tidy around the outside of our building. We will also be cleaning out the container. The container by the way currently holds a large quantity of high quality ply wood that has been fetched by Wes Weight and the Wes's workshop crew from a new source. **The plywood is available to all members to take home.** We will also be painting the outside of the container. It will be easier to spray paint the container and if you have a spray gun we can use, please contact Colin Groves (we will be using acrylic paint).

Also needed - mowers, brush cutters, rakes, shovels, outside brooms, etc. On the inside some repair work to the walls and floor will be undertaken to plug the old duct holes.

The council has advised that the kitchen extension design and remit has been completed and the documents are currently with their procurement department who will put the work out to tender. It was suggested that during construction the workshop may not be able to be used – the committee has resolved to strenuously negotiate some compromise whereby we can continue to use our workshop without interfering with construction or causing any safety risks. We cannot however seek a resolution. until the contractor is selected as it is they who have discretion.

Further to the first item in my report - I cannot resist posting my new router system. Not exactly the same quality as the new unit the club has acquired but at a small fraction of the cost it is my view at least as good – or better. I have a router table with an old but very good GMC 3 ¹/₂ HP router. Like all routers setting the bit height and changing bits was very tedious using the adjustment knob under the table. I had modified the knob to an easier to use wheel but still it was unsatisfactory. SO....I have added a linear actuator, of the type used to adjust car seats, and a simple electronic controller that gives jogging speed up/down and variable speed to adjust to precise position. It works a treat and if anyone is interested I am willing to advise (but not do the work) on how to copy it for yourself.





And one more thing – every now and then I see a workshop that elicits great envy – oh to have such a luxurious setup as in this short and very interesting video courtesy of Australian Wood Review magazine.

EEE is an abrasive paste that is applied on the lathe after sanding, it 'sands' the wood to a very fine finish and Glo is a wax friction polish finish, made by U Beaut in Geelong.

Finally, Soo, who has recently completed the Saturday Turners Training, has been re-working a

set of bed posts found on the road side into legs for a stool. The square sections were done using the jointer/thicknesser and the pommel and below were all done on the lathe.

That Möbius Strip

On a recent trip to visit our family in NSW my grandson made a Möbius strip to show me. I had never seen this before and I was fascinated, and told my grandson that I was going to make one. He then asked how, and I told him that I would make it out of wood. He then said the magic words, "you can't do that". With that said the challenge was set.

When I got home I thought how was I going to do this and my immediate plan was to carve it. This was a bit tricky as my paper sample was very floppy and I couldn't quite figure it out. Next I thought of using the club steam bending device, but I dismissed that idea as I would have to bend

and twist the wood at the same time and I didn't think that was possible.

So I eventually decided to use a small piece of Huon Pine and put it through the thicknesser to machine it down to around 2mm thick. Next I boiled this is a pot of water for a while and it became very pliable. This allowed me to bend it and twist it in any position that I wanted. Holding it in clamps at the two ends until it cooled and it stayed exactly as I wanted. All I had to do then was glue the two ends together and what do you know I have a wooden Möbius strip.



I sent a picture of the finished item to my grandson and he replied with a "Pretty cool" so I guess I passed the grandpa test.

For those interested some facts behind the Möbius strip. It was discovered in 1858 by a German mathematician called "August Ferdinand Möbius". It only has one side and one edge. If you draw a line around the centre of it by the time you get back to the starting point you will have a line on both sides and your pencil will not have left the surface.My next challenge now that I have a hard sample is to carve one out of wood. *David Green.*


A great idea from regular contributor Jim Stockton:

A note on something I made for a friend who had a temporary disability. I suspect there is quite a large demand for low technology aids like this and that members would enjoy the challenge of designing and making them.

The things woodworkers get up to, or Toast butterer Mark 2:

One of the problems of getting older is that my friends are doing it too and they seem to be prone to damaging themselves.

It wasn't that much of a surprise when a friend requested a way to hold a slice of toast so she could butter it while she could only use one hand (her non-dominant hand) for a few weeks. So, scrap pile to the rescue for pieces of hardwood for the base, the ledge that rests against the edge of a bench to hold it in place and two small pieces screwed to form a right angle that keep the toast from sliding away. I know that sounds pretty simple but like most experiments, the prototype worked okay, and Mark 2 with the holding pieces rotated 45 degrees worked better.



Please let me know if anyone you know is facing similar challenges. It's fun to try to find ways to solve them.

<u>A Woodworker's Country Ramblings. Pt. 1</u>



After having moved up to The Northeast of the State and after a couple of prompts from Charlie Camera and Steve Hood, I Have finally started to write about my experiences in the move north and what has happened and what I have done.

I have joined the local woodworking club, Albury/Wodonga Woodcrafters Inc., and I was asked, last year, to resurrect and run the furniture group, which is up and running as well as training some of the members on how to use hand tools and the correct and safe way to operate the machinery so far it is a successful operation.

The club has a wide array of machinery, a new addition is a Wood Wizz which will be installed when the extension is completed (3 metres by 20

metres a good-sized extension). Photos to follow.

The club has a shop on the Lincoln Causeway (the old part of the Hume Highway between Wodonga and Albury) it is The Cottage. It is where members can place items that they have made for sale, there is a commission that the club takes on all items sold on the members' behalf.

The various groups are encouraged to make items as a community for the club to sell, the furniture group has finished a quality hall table in London Plane for the top and Osage Orange for the frame and legs finished in Danish oil (3 coats and wax finish on top) Again photos to follow.





The club has its own Mill and timber storage at one of the members farms, the mill equipment is 2 Lucas mill, 1 is a chainsaw slabbing mill and the 2nd one is the big saw blade. Members can purchase any of the timber at a reasonable price as well as turning blanks once they have seasoned, I have purchased a couple of pieces of Red Gum for \$10 it was 100mm X 90mm X 1.1mt., it machined up beautifully (I needed it for the stringers on the dining chairs). I have been fortunate to receive a couple of commissions from the cottage for a shoe rack and bench as well as a blackboard with a white board on an easel. Once more, photos next installment.

We have found that the beauty of living up here is that nothing is more than 15 minutes away; even going out to the mill.





Our new home is well under way with completion due in August and I have a 6mt. X 9mt. shed to be built in the next couple of weeks so I will have a place to (hide) potter away in making more toys.

Club Market place

The club still has our old Dust extractors to sell off. Both are in very good working condition and would be very suitable in appropriate situations. The larger is a three phase unit, however, it is wired up as 220 volt per phase and can be operated off a single phase 15 amp circuit with a low cost inverter (about \$180 or less). It is 5 hp and would suit a medium sized workshop where machines are operated simultaneously. The second is single phase 2 HP and will suit any workshop where one machine is operated at a time and has a normal 3 pin 10 amp plug. This unit can be installed without any fuss and comes with some ducting. Please contact to express interest



and we may be able to work out a good price.

We also have the Triton TRA001 router from the router table which is still in near new condition. This would be excellent for a router table

and is easily installed - it comes with a router table plate that fits into standard openings on commercial tables or can be easily rebated into a wooden, phenolic or melamine top. The new price is about \$500 for the router and \$150



for the insert plate but we have a very good deal for the first inquirer.
