We have applied for a booking for those days and will advise once confirmed, as there are still many things which could go awry and lead to the cancellation of the exhibition. Adrian DesFontaines is taking over the **exhibition committee**, effective now. Geoff Olivers' info brief was terrific and will help us to continue with organisation of successful shows.

BBQ – we are planning to hold a **BBQ lunch** for members on Saturday, March 5th, at around noon. The committee will provide sausages, burgers, breads and salads at no charge to members. You would need to **BYO drinks**, perhaps a **folding chair**. We are looking for indication on who would be interested in coming to a purely social gathering like that. If you'd like to come along, let Charlie know and we'll firm it up.

The BBQ will be followed by a **general meeting** of the club, to be held the Club rooms. All are welcome, wear your badge perhaps for the newer members to get to know you.

Charlie and I recently visited the **Eltham Men's Shed**, to check out what they do. The member and community outlook are much broader than ours, encompassing a whole lot of things which are not woodwork. That said their camaraderie seems strong. They meet every Monday morning, which we probably won't ever do!!! They seem to be fulfilling their brief of supporting men in the community. Annual fees are \$250.00 plus mandatory clothing. We may eventually find ways in which we can assist each other as groups, but we'll wait and see for now.


The committee has launched a **new sub-committee** to look at various items to ensure maximum benefit for our members and also the best long term direction of the club. Most of the work for this will be with the input of you the members, so we may ask your opinions from time to time. We welcome suggestions at anytime of course, but we are in a good position at the moment to both maintain existing equipment and to acquire new equipment. Your input on both topics would assist the committee greatly, as we seek to provide the best possible facilities to members.

Help wanted: We have quite a few new members who are still in the workforce, with availability to access the club limited to evenings and weekends. We're looking to have more members to assist with **opening times** for safety courses, mentoring and group management. Are you able to assist?

Around the Workshop

The order for our new dust extraction system has now been placed and is expected to be erected within the next 6 weeks. The process of seeking bids, evaluating proposals and selecting a supplier has been a big and complex job that has involved the committee assisted by Steve Hood and Barry Lay in a great deal of work. During the quote process our preferred supplier EziDuct Pty Ltd had significant staff problems causing a great deal of confusion and delays. With their senior management's assistance matters now seem to be

ironed out. The installation will entail the standard overhead ducting which will impact the look of the machine room. However the overall gain will be a quieter, far more efficient system servicing all existing machinery including small units and able to be used with the lathes (though not at the same time as the machine room). Provision has been made for a future double drum sander in the bandsaw room. One of the best feature/ benefits will be a very easy to empty wheelie bin on the collector. NOTE _ The drawing opposite is indicative of placement – the outlets for the lathes are actually in line.



A number of complaints have been made regarding tidiness which seems to have gone missing around the workshop. The tool store is especially in need of a good clean and tidy up and many partly completed works have been left in the way for an excessive period of time. Of particular note is the tendency for drill bits and small accessories to be thrown into a haphazard heap on the tool store shelves instead of being replaced into holders. Members are reminded that all shavings and dust must be cleared up at the end of a session, all tools and accessories stored in their PROPER PLACE and glue ups must be left in an out of the way place and dismantled as soon as possible. A tidy up day will be organised soon.

Sandpaper

There is a box with some rolls of sandpaper in the assembly room donated by the Victorian Men's Shed association (VMSA). Please feel free to cut off some lengths to take home but please be considerate and only take what you can genuinely use in a reasonable period as we do expect to get more in future.



Free crackle Finish

We have been given a box of Crackle Finish by the Australian Men's Shed Association (AMSA). This may not be up to everyone's taste but if so there are two parts to the technique- one is a base coat of clear water based lacquer and the other is a special crackle coat. I have tested the clear lacquer (large can) and it looks like an excellent water based finish material and may be used as such.

Free tools

There are some fairly nondescript tools in the assembly room which were donated to the club. If you do not have many tools at home you might like to take whatever will be useful. All have been checked by Rado Starec for safety.





Mini Lathe

A former member is hanging up his wood turning chisels and has a mini lather for sale. This is identical to the mini lathes in our club and includes a full set of accessories including a very good 90 mm scroll chuck. This lathe is ideal for small work and very good for turning pens – (a pen mandrel is not included but only costs about \$25).

He also has a 100 mm scroll chuck with standard thread (30mm x 3.5) to sell separately.



FREE — There is a pile of donated wood turning blanks, some tiles and some magazines in the assembly room to take. Mostly of interest for wood turners but anyone is welcome.

These need to be moved ASAP so please be quick.

Instrument Group:

The instrument group will continue again this year, combined with the box making group, giving us an extra day each month ($3^{\rm rd}$ Saturday). The club has experience in the building of guitars, ukuleles and three and four string box guitars. If





some of the group members are willing we could try to work together to make a traditional ukulele at first, your choice of model, using a more suitable timber for quality and ease of

assembly. I have ready made moulds but you may make your own to

use at home as well as at the club.


